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Summer is fast approaching us and the break is a perfect opportunity for college students to get their feet wet in becoming gainfully employed. Young adults throughout the region will have an opportunity to earn a summer income, while learning the inner workings of a business.

South Florida Workforce Investment Board (SFWIB) kicks-off the Career Pathway Compact Summer Employment Program, an initiative with Miami-Dade Education Partnership, aimed to provide young adults between the ages of 18-24 from low-income families the opportunity to earn a summer income and enhance their work-readiness skills.

A collaborative effort with Miami-Dade County, SFWIB, made \$1.5 million dollars available for this worthy initiative. This eight to ten week education internship program will provide young adults with entry-level positions within governmental agencies, local businesses and community-based organizations. The selection process will be done by lottery for candidates who meet program eligibility requirements.

"We appreciate the support from the County and Mayor Carlos A. Gimenez," said Rick Beasley, executive director of South Florida Workforce Investment Board. "This program will provide college-age students from our economically-challenged communities with an invaluable opportunity to participate in paid internships with local business this summer, and in the process become better equipped for future job opportunities," he added.

Businesses interested in hiring a young adult can also benefit from this opportunity. "The value of hiring young adults, particularly in a challenging economic environment, merits the investment because it provides employers an opportunity to not only assist young adults with gaining valuable work experience and new skills, but it also helps to promote and stimulate economic development," said Rick Beasley. "The money earned by the young adults goes directly back into our local economy, virtually, dollar for dollar," he further added.

On her recent visit, accolades were given from U.S. Secretary of Labor Hilda Solis to South Florida Workforce Investment Board (SFWIB), Miami Dade College and University of Miami for its collaborative efforts on job creation at the new University of Miami Life Science and Technology Park.

These three institutions teamed up to help foster life science careers-training and bolster employment opportunities for Overtown and other neighboring communities of the facility.

The partnership was made possible by a \$400,000 grant from SFWIB that was designed to ensure the community has sufficient talent for the growing life sciences sector. This initiative will identify adults and high school students from the surrounding areas who share interest in health care or bioscience careers. The center will help provide access to existing programs and offer academic and career advice as well as job training.

Students will be able to choose from studies in occupations ranging from health science to biotechnology that could lead to degrees in biological sciences. Participants who successfully complete the program are guaranteed a placement in a job. This joint initiative provides an excellent example of how SFWIB is working with educational institutions and employers to help sustain economic growth in our region.

The state-of-the-art park, which was officially dedicated September of 2011 and is nestled in the region's most important hospitals, medical facilities and MDC's Medical Campus, has the potential to make Miami a bioscience hub. The services offered to veterans at no cost are job placement, being connected with employers, access to labor market information and more.

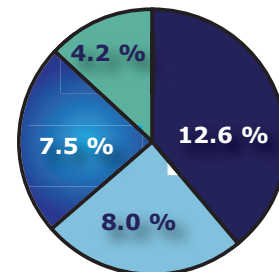

TRAINING YOUTH FOR CAREERS IN STEM

The South Florida Workforce Investment Board (SFWIB) was one of only four regional workforce boards in the state awarded \$157,000 to implement Youth STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) Training and Employment program.

SFWIB partnered with Miami Dade College affording a cohort of 40 eligible young adults to fully engage in a STEM-related



Field Tour of the Tissue Bank located at the UM Life Science & Technology Park

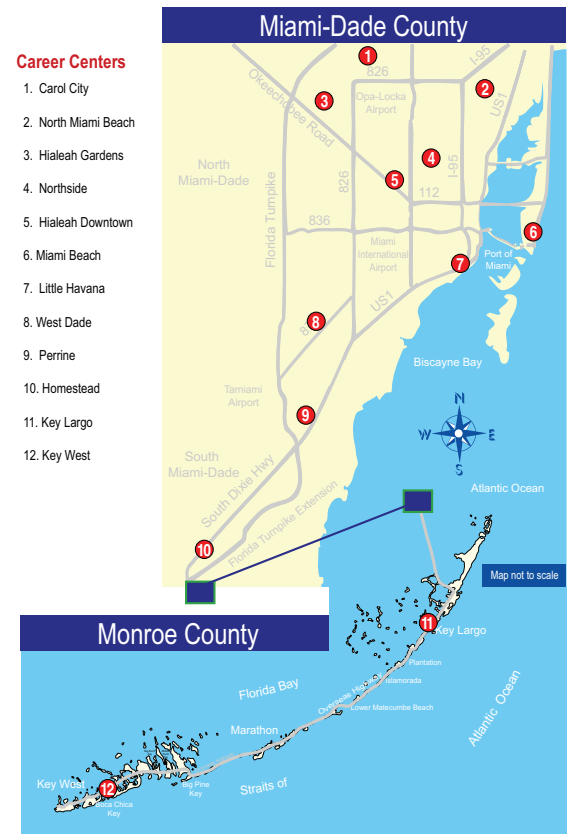
field of study and workforce activities through a Biotechnology College Credit Certificate (CCC) program. Participants who successfully complete the program have the option to enroll in the Biotechnology Associates in Science program.

SFWIB will cover all training cost through grants, Individual Training Account (ITA), a voucher provided to job seekers who need occupational skills training to become gainfully employed or re-employed, and matching funds.

The overall economic competitiveness in this region is contingent upon young people becoming self-sufficient for stem-related occupations, which are forecasted to grow about 70 percent faster than employment in other occupations. SFWIB takes great pride in preparing an adequate supply of qualified future workers for employment in STEM fields.

SFWIB has partnered with several employers including the University Of Miami, Miller School of Medicine to facilitate hiring participants for STEM-related internships or job shadowing. Upon successful completion of the program, participants are qualified to gain entry-level positions as research assistants, lab technicians, quality control technicians, assay analyst, chemical technician, biological technician and microbiologists.
