1. Call to Order and Introductions

Council Chairman, Clarence Brown called the meeting to order at 8:10am, asked all those present to introduce themselves and noted that a quorum had not been achieved.

2. Approval of Youth Council Minutes of June 20, 2013.

3. Recommendation – Approval to Allocate Funding to Career Center Providers for the Work Readiness Young Adult Employment Program

Mr. Brown introduced the item and Ms. Morgan further discussed, noting staff's recommendation for the Council's approval to recommend to the Board, funds to be allocated to Career Center Providers for the Work Readiness Young Adult Employment Program.

Ms. Ferradaz asked whether the funds would be evenly divided among the career centers. Ms. Morgan further explained.

Mr. West requested a copy of last year's report.

Ms. Ferradaz asked whether last year's funds were fully expended.

Executive Director Rick Beasley arrived and responded the above questions.

This item was recommended to the Board by consensus of the members present.

4. Information – Community Development Block Grant Funding

Mr. Brown introduced the item and Mr. Beasley further discussed, noting that in Partnership with Miami-Dade County Mayor's office and Public Housing and Community Development, SFW submitted two proposals for CDBG funding to support a job skills training program for Temporary Assistance for Needy Family (TANF) recipients and employment program for youth.

Mr. West inquired about additional funding. Mr. Brown explained by giving an overview of the program funding policy and processes.

Mr. West asked whether there would be any possibility to get additional funding. Mr. Brown further explained.

Mr. West requested this item be presented to the full Board

5. Recommendation – Approval to Allocate Funding to Miami Dade College – Take Stock in Children Scholarship Program

Mr. Brown introduced the item and Ms. Morgan further discussed, noting staff's recommendation for the Council's approval to allocate funding in an amount not exceed \$425,000 to support the Take Stock in Children Scholarship for the following programs:

- ✓ Miami-Dade College
- ✓ Take Stock in Children
- ✓ 5000 Role Models of Excellence
- ✓ Mexican American Council
- ✓ Big Brother Big Sister

Ms. Morgan additionally noted that Miami Dade College would be the fiscal agent for these programs. She additionally noted into record the recommendation to waive the competitive procurement processes.

Mr. West inquired about all administrative costs and Ms. Morgan explained.

Mr. Brown requested staff provide clarification regarding administrative and program costs.

Mr. West requested the language be revised providing details regarding all costs associated with administrative and program.

This item was recommended to the Board by consensus of the members present.

6. Recommendation – Approval to Allocate Funding to Miami Dade College – Future Banker’s Training Program

Mr. Brown introduced the item and Ms. Morgan further discussed noting staff’s recommendation for the Council’s approval to recommend to the Board to allocate youth funding in an amount not to exceed \$32,000 for the period covering program year July 1, 2013 to June 30th 2014 to support the Miami Dade College Future Banker’s Training Program. She additionally noted staff’s recommendation to waive the competitive procurement process.

This item was recommended to the Board by consensus of the members present.

7. Recommendation – Approval to Allocate Funding to Miami-Dade County Public School Board

Mr. Brown introduced the item. Ms. Morgan further discussed, noting staff’s recommendation for the Council’s approval to recommend to the Board to allocate youth funding in an amount not to exceed \$50,000 for the period covering program year July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014. She moreover noted that this would be to cover the cost of a teacher/counselor position for the Department of Juvenile Justice/ M-DCPS Project serving adjudicated and foster care youth.

Ms. Ferradaz asked whether dependent children can participate in this program and Ms. Morgan’s responded, “Yes”.

Mr. West asked whether this request was previously approved by the Council and full Board.

Ms. Ferradaz requested staff explain the duties of the Liaison position and Ms. Morgan explained that the position would entail traveling back and forth to the school board, as well as the juvenile courts.

This item was recommended to the Board by consensus of the members present.

8. Recommendation – Approval to Allocate Funding to The City of Key West – Fire Academy Training Program

Mr. Brown introduced the item. Ms. Morgan further presented and read the item into record, noting staff’s recommendation for the Council’s approval to recommend to the Board to allocate youth funding in an amount not to exceed \$37,000 for the period covering Program Year July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014 to support the City of Key West Fire Academy Training Program. She additionally noted staff’s recommendation to waive the competitive procurement process.

Ms. Ferradaz inquired about the Academy’s schedule and Ms. Morgan provided details.

This item was recommended to the Board by consensus of the members present.

9. Recommendation – Approval to Allocate Funding to Miami-Dade County Internship Program

Mr. Brown introduced the item then recused himself from participating in the discussion due to a declared conflict.

[Council Chairman Brown stepped out of the meeting room]

Ms. Morgan further discussed the item, noting staff's recommendation for the Council's approval to recommend to the Board to allocate youth funding in an amount not to exceed \$250,500 for the period covering Program Year July 1, 2013 to November 30, 2013. She additionally noted into record the recommendation to waive the competitive procurement process.

Ms. Ferradaz inquired about the program end date and Ms. Morgan responded November 30.

Mr. West inquired about placements and Ms. Morgan responded that a few students have been placed.

Ms. Ferradaz recommended extending the program longer than the above requested period, in order to fully expend the funds. Ms. Morgan however, advised that all unexpended funds would be carried over.

Ms. Ferradaz inquired about the amount of hours students would be allowed to work and Ms. Morgan explained.

This item was recommended to the Board by consensus of the members present.

1. Call to Order and Introductions

Council Chairman, Clarence Brown called the meeting to order at 8:35am, asked all those present introduce themselves and noted that a quorum had not been achieved.

2. Approval of Youth Council Minutes of October 17, 2013 and December 19, 2013.

SFWIB Chairman Alvin West moved the approval of October 17, 2013 and December 19, 2013 meeting minutes. Motion seconded by Ms. Gilda Ferradaz; **Motion Passed Unanimously**

Prior to discussing the next item, Youth Programs Manager, Myria Morgan briefly updated the Council regarding the rebranding of South Florida Workforce to Career Source South Florida.

8. Recommendation as to Approval of the Allocation of Youth Funds to the Future Bankers Training Program

Ms. Morgan presented the item and noted staff's recommendation for the Council's approval to recommend to the Board the approval to allocate additional youth funding in an amount not to exceed \$10,000 to support the Miami-Dade College Future Bankers Training program. She additionally noted that staff presented a check to Miami-Dade College at one of its board meetings in the amount of \$32,000 for the Future Bankers Training Program. She further noted that staff requested the competitive procurement process be waived.

SFWIB Chairman Alvin West moved the approval to allocate youth funds for the Future Bankers Training Program. Motion seconded by Ms. Wanda Walker; **Further Discussion(s):**

Ms. Walker requested staff verify the total amount and it was confirmed by Ms. Morgan.

Mr. West inquired about the amount of students that would be recruited for this program and Ms. Morgan responded a total of 32.

Ms. Ferradaz inquired about the cost per student and Ms. Morgan stated that the cost per student is \$1,600. Mr. West added that the total amount per student would be \$2,119 the contributions received by the banks are included in the grand total.

Mr. West inquired about the total enrollment and internships and Ms. Morgan explained that the information inquired about telling about total enrollments and internships and Ms. Morgan explained that the information inquired about total enrollment period for the duration and the time of the meeting.

Mr. Talbert asked how long is the program and Ms. Morgan responded a total of two to three months which consist of one month of training and one to two months of work experience.

Council Chairman Clarence Brown inquired about the funding streams for this program had it not been initially budgeted and Ms. Morgan explained that the funding streams would have been from the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) funds.

Mr. West inquired about total enrollments and internships and Ms. Morgan explained that the information had not been readily available, but she would provide this information to the Council at a later date. Time has been readily available but should be provided this information to the Council meeting.

3. Information – Aviation STEM Initiative – South Florida Fly-In and Educational Expo – “Operations SAVEE Flight”

Ms. Morgan presented the item then introduced Mr. Dal Roberts of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) who appeared before the Council. He noted it included four categories with Florida Memorial University also presented. He additionally explained that the program consists of various activities and he also representing for the duration of the meeting.

She additionally noted that staff met with the Federal Aviation Administration. She additionally noted that there will be two sessions for the National Flight Academy.

West asked whether the students that participated in the National Flight Academy would be the ones selected for the internships. Ms. Morgan responded, yes.

Mr. West requested staff verify the total amount of students that would be participating in this year’s National Flight Academy. Ms. Morgan responded a total of 250 students which consist of 100 from Monroe County, 100 from Miami-Dade County and 50 from the Housing Department.

Mr. West inquired about the cost of \$30,000 per flight. Mr. Roberts further explained.

- ✓ 1487 in-school and out-of-school youth attained an increase in their skill attainment performance measure
- ✓ 255 in-school youth exited the program with a positive outcome
- ✓ 94 out-of-school youth exited the program with a positive outcome
- ✓ 8 out-of-school youth enrolled in the adult the program with a positive outcome

BACKGROUND:

CareerSource South Florida representing the city of Miami, was one of ten cities selected to submit an application to operate a civic engagement and youth leadership development program for volunteers. The other cities included - Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Los Angeles, New York, Newark, San Francisco, St. Louis, and Washington, D.C.

Points of Light is an international nonprofit, nonpartisan organization dedicated to engaging people and resources in solving serious social problems through voluntary service. Points of Light announced the sponsorship of this national service grant opportunity to increase prospects for increasing community engagement, job readiness, higher education and employment among low to moderate income young adults ages 16 to 24 year-olds.

Selected host sites will have a team of five AmeriCorps VISTA members to operate the volunteer program and will receive a grant to cover supervision of and supplies for the volunteer members, as well as, other program implementation-related expenses. Potential host sites should have expertise in engaging low- to moderate-income young adults. Members will be placed at the host sites for one-year engagements and will be responsible for recruiting youth to participate in the core curriculum.

The time line for program to operate is August 2014 - August 2015.

STRATEGIC PROJECT: The Age 14 to 24 Agenda

BACKGROUND:

Volunteer Florida requested that Career Source Florida, Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) and the Regional Workforce Boards consider applying for AmeriCorps State grant funding. The Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) invited Career Source South Florida (CSSF) to participate in this pilot project. The proposed project will target “at-risk youth” to include youth from the inner city or rural areas, areas with high crime rates and areas with a high number of welfare transition recipients.

AmeriCorps programs provide opportunities for Americans to make an intensive commitment to service. The AmeriCorps network of local, state, and national service programs engages more than 80,000 Americans in projects around the nation each year. AmeriCorps members make a year-long commitment to serve at a nonprofit organization, public agency or other qualified organization.

The selected date(s) for the project to start is August 1, 2014 – July 31, 2015 or January 1, 2015 – December 31, 2015. The project is proposed for a one-year grant, however, it is expected to be renewed annually. CSSF is proposing to sponsor ten volunteers for this pilot project, who will be assigned to five high schools, serving as teams of two members.

If awarded this grant, CSSF will coordinate service activities with Miami-Dade County Public Schools and City Year Miami. City Year Miami is an education-focused, nonprofit organization that partners with public schools to help keep students in school and on track to graduate. City Year Miami members support students by focusing on attendance, behavior, and course performance through in-class tutoring, mentoring, and after school programs.

The Department of Economic Opportunity and Career Source South Florida responsibilities, include, but are limited to:

1. DEO would be the grant applicant.
2. CSSF would provide local management and oversight of AmeriCorps members, including:
 - a. Recruit and supervise a minimum of three (3) AmeriCorps members
 - b. Evaluation of the member's performance
 - c. Data collection
 - d. Coordination with DEO for stipend management
 - e. Provide and participate in federal or state-developed training

Suggested AmeriCorps member activities include but are not limited to:

1. Pre-Employment Training/Work Maturity
2. Tutoring, Study, Skills Training and Instruction
3. Adult Mentoring
4. Counseling
5. Job Placement, Career and Education Services

BACKGROUND:

The objective of the Black Male College Explorers Program (BMCEP) is designed as an at-risk prevention/intervention program specifically to prevent black males from dropping out of school, and to increase the amount of black males graduating from high school, facilitate their admission to college, and significantly increase their chances of earning a college degree.

Florida Memorial University provides six weeks of highly concentrated developmental experiences during the summer to at-risk black males in grades 6th-12th, while the students live on campus. High school and college professors are hired to teach Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) subjects. Personal growth and developmental activities are provided through weekly seminars and workshops.

The Black Male College Explorers Program in the State of Florida is sponsored at Florida Memorial University (FMU), Edward Waters College (EWC), Bethune-Cookman University (BCU), and Florida A&M University (FAMU).

A representative from Florida Memorial University will provide a presentation detailing the history of the program, activities and services provided, impact of the program, partnerships and more.

On October 17, 2013, the Youth Council and Board approved funding for an amount not to exceed \$200,000 in Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) funds to support the National Flight Academy – Explore Ambition Program (NFA). The funds will support 200 students from Miami-Dade and Monroe County School Districts to participate in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) disciplines through the NFA Aviation Program.

The below is an update of the Spring Break, March 23-28, 2014 trip:

- 82 students registered to attend the National Flight Academy
- 59 students from Miami-Dade County Public Schools attended
- 20 students from Monroe County School District attended
- The next trip for both Miami-Dade County Public Schools and Monroe County School District is scheduled for June 8-14, 2014, each to send 50 students.

BACKGROUND:

Performance measures for the Youth Service Providers and Region covering the period of July 1, 2013 through April 4, 2014 as represented on the State's Monthly Management Report (MMR) Year-to-Date are as follows:

- 337 of 341 in-school and out-of-school youth exited the program with a positive outcome (obtain a credential/diploma, post-secondary education, advanced training/qualified apprenticeships, military, employment). The Region's younger youth positive outcome performance measure is 98.83 percent.
- 2108 of 2096 in-school and out-of-school youth attained an increase in their skill attainment performance measure (basic skills, work readiness skills, occupational skills). The Region's youth skill attainment performance measure is 99.40 percent.
- 276 of 279 in-school youth exited the program with a positive outcome (obtain a credential/diploma, post-secondary education, advanced training/qualified apprenticeships, military, employment). The Region's in-school youth positive outcome performance measure is 98.92 percent.
- 141 of 142 out-of-school youth exited the program with a positive outcome (obtain a credential/diploma, post-secondary education, advanced training/qualified apprenticeships, military, employment). The Region's out-of-school youth positive outcome performance measure is 99.30 percent.
- 9 of 14 out-of-school youth enrolled in the adult centers exited the program with a positive outcome (obtain a credential/diploma, post-secondary education, advanced training/qualified apprenticeships, military, employment). The Region's out-of-school youth enrolled in the adult centers positive outcome performance measure is 64.00 percent.

As a network, youth service providers and adult service centers have exceeded four out of the four State required performance measures. The attached chart displays the performance measures for which providers are held

accountable, the overall year-to-date performance for the entire youth network, and details each provider's individual performance measures.
